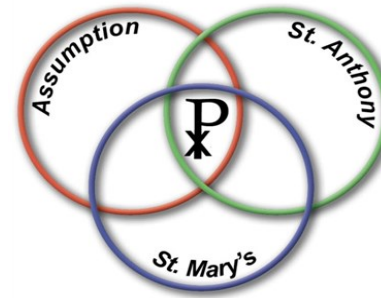

Father's Corner... Next Sunday is the *Feast of Christ the King*. This is the Church's parallel to the Super Bowl, or the final game of the World Series. The Church's Liturgical Year concludes with the Feast of Christ the King.

This feast was instituted by Pope Pius XI, in 1925, for the 16th centenary of the Council of Nicaea. The Feast is to foster awareness of Christ's dominion over all people and to establish peace among nations. The Feast celebrates Christ's kingship in a non-worldly way. Jesus was anointed by the Father with the oil of gladness as the Eternal Priest and Universal King. As Eternal Priest, He offered His life on the altar of the Cross and redeemed us all. Jesus is the messianic king, the redeemer who by His death and resurrection has obtained salvation for us. As king, He claims dominion over all creation that He may present to God the Father a Kingdom of truth, and life, a Kingdom of holiness and grace, a Kingdom of justice, love and peace. All human persons, institutions and nations are subordinate to Christ.

We are the adopted children of God and the future citizens and heirs of the Kingdom of Heaven. We are called to be loyal to Christ by the quality of our Christian commitment expressed in our serving of other with sacrifice and forgiving love and by our solidarity with the poor. Do we allow Christ to be King of our hearts? Are we living the Sermon on the Mount, the Beatitudes, the Corporal Works of Mercy, the Spiritual Works of Mercy, are we "Loving God with all your being and loving others as Christ love us?"

Mary, the Mother of Christ, occupies a special place in the hearts of Catholics. It is she to whom many turn for the aid, consolation, and love needed when human needs are not fulfilled and when they need a heavenly Mother. Just as little children sometimes stand in awe of the father of the family and need a mother's hand to hold, many Catholics are led to the Father by the hand of Mary.

Tragically, Mary's role in Catholic theology has often been misunderstood by non-Catholics and Catholics alike. Although all Christians honor her as the Mother of Christ, many are critical of what they perceive as the status accorded her by the Catholic Church. Most of this criticism, we believe, stems from misunderstanding. Unfortunately, Catholics themselves sometimes increase this misunderstanding by their failure to understand the teachings of their own religion and by some of their pious but erroneous customs and actions.

In Roman Catholic theology, *God alone is adored as the Almighty*, the one true foundation of redemption. God is triune God - the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. For us, God is honored through His angels and His saints. Mary is a saint and, above that, occupies a special place in the salvation of mankind.

The specific type of love we accord to God and God alone is called *latria*. This is the adoration and love of the one divine Entity. To the saints, we accord a love called *dulia*. We honor, love, respect them, and ask their aid (intercession) because they have been set aside by God through their relationship with Him. For Mary, *hyperdulia* is the type of love we have. Just as with the saints, we honor her, love and respect her, and ask her intercession. Her love is "hyper" or above, that of the other saints because we believe that God, through His will, gave her a status not enjoyed by anyone else.

Catholics believe that Mary was conceived without the stain of sin, which was the lot of all of the rest of mankind from the time of the fall from grace of the first man. Nonetheless, this woman conceived without sin was asked by God if she would consent to be the Mother of His Son. Mary could have said no! Just like all of mankind, Mary was given free will. At the Annunciation, Mary gave her consent in her *fiat*: "Let it be done to me according to your word."

Each valid Catholic devotion to Mary has a historical basis. Sadly, it is often some of the "trappings" of these devotions which can cause misunderstandings by our non-Catholic Christian brother and sisters. Let us consider one - the *Queenship of Mary*. To consider Mary as the queen of all saints, we often refer to her as a queen. A queen is, by birth or action of the king, the most honored woman in a land. At her designation as queen, she is given the symbols of her queenship - a crown and scepter. She is presented with gifts of the best the country has to offer. She reigns over her people. Catholics consider Mary as queen - a queen of human hearts. This does not mean that they forget the place of the King of Kings - only that they believe He has appointed a queen to assist Him in His reign. However, when Catholics crown images of Our Lady with rich jewels or flowers, and perform pious exercises such as walking to a church on their knees, their actions are often mistaken by non-Catholics who may gain the impression that Catholics have, in honoring the Queen, completely forgotten that she reigns only through the action of the King. Does this mean that Catholic devotion to Mary as Queen should be discontinued? No. Only that Catholics must take great care to completely understand their devotions and to be able to explain them to those who truly wish to understand.

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A Servant's Reflection ... With my kids bringing homework home and asking questions, it made me think how close scripture is to math ... specifically story problems. Rather than the school math noting Jane had 2 apples and 3 pears, how many pieces of fruit did Jane have, we see in scripture life problems. The life story problems Jesus presents us with, I would speculate, most of us often miss the insertion of “how should that parable or story inspire me in my life to do better?” Problems such as the Gospel on Wednesday talking about the healing of the 10 lepers and 1 returning to give thanks.

What if we were one of the lepers, what would our action be after being cured? Jesus told the lepers to go see the priest, would we go to show the priest our cure, returning to Jesus to give thanks; or upon healing would we see how much life we have missed out on, hence be going out to live more actively? Essentially forgetting to give thanks?

We see “story” problems each time we read or hear scripture, are we trying to solve the problem as it inspires our life or do we tend to look at scripture as light reading? Each time we find ourselves in Jesus’ presence, such as in scripture, we are being called to become closer to Him ... which involves trying to act more like Him ... meaning we are being asked to change!! Are we taking the opportunity each time we are in the presence of scripture to change as Jesus wants ... or do we forget to give thanks for the “story” problems that Jesus gave us to solve?

May the Holy Spirit guide you in all that you do! Deacon Ryan
